ORTHOGRAPHIC MISTAKES IN CHATTING CONVERSATIONS

Abstract

The present study tackles orthographic mistakes in chatting conversations. The sample of the study is male – female British participants' conversations. The study attempts to investigate the use of some orthographic mistakes in the chatting of the participants. The results are shown in tables.

1. 1. Chatting

Chatting is a general term used to describe real time communication that occurs over the internet using software that is installed on the internet devices. Originally, the term chat has been used to describe the act of exchanging typed messages or text chat. Now days, chatting refers to the act of exchanging videos, pictures, sounds, text messages, and data (Scheider and Evans, 2009: 339). Online chat according to Charles(2013: 5) facilitates the synchronous exchange of messages and information in text forms by means of computers.

Internet chatting is a text based form of communication which occurs in real time. It is most often designated as a tool for enhancing social interaction and instilling a sense of community among learners. As such many studies have found that chatting provides more spontaneous and equal participation and this facilitate asking questions and providing answers (Osman and Herring, 2007: 2).

Using chatting programs, a user types a message in computer keyboard, messages will be displayed in front of other chatters immediately after (s)he press the enter key. Participants can see the reply for their asking soon after they send their messages (Hofstetter, 2006: 10).

Language in chatting varies widely depending on participants, topic and the general tone of the chatting room (Greiffenstern, 2010: 39). Chatting can be a continuous discussion about a specific topic or different topics. Some participants may be engaged in a long discussion about a specific topic, whereas others engage in open discussion (Scheider and Evans, 2009: 339).

Language of chatting exhibits certain characteristics which makes it unlike other forms of communication. Participants use some lexical, semantic, syntactic and paralinguistic characteristics of language which are likely to be more creative and distinctive. As Al-Zhrani (2010: 1363) explains Creativity is the most evident feature in Chatting since chatters have developed new ways of communication by using new linguistic and paralinguistic features of language. Additionally, such developed means of communication has linguistic and social consequences on people who use it.

Language used in online communication is described as being a special kind of English. Such a language gets close to social life and reflects new changes of modern society. Just as the linguist David Crystal states in his book Language and the Internet, "If the Internet is a revolution, therefore, it is likely to be a new linguistic revolution" (Crystal, 2001). Such words reflects the importance behind investigating text based online communication(cited in Ya-dong and Kui, 2013: 105).

Internet facilitates engagement in multiple relationships around the world. Some programs like Facebook, Skype and many others are designed to facilitate this process. Al-Zhrani (2010: 1359) stats that these systems are designed to get new friends, have fun, get some relax and share feelings with others.

1. 2. Types of Chatting Interaction

Chatting is an online interactive communication mechanism that enables people to make real time discussion with multiple people. Basically, interaction in chatting is divided in to private or group chatting.

In private chat, participants engage in one to one conversation so that no one else can participate in their conversation. This type of chat interaction is preferred for its privacy. Participants should be online when conducting a private chat. In some programs like Facebook participants can see who is available online (Burgess, 2001: 38).

Group chatting is continuous discussions on a particular topic, organized in 'rooms' at particular Internet sites, in which computer users interested in the topic can participate. Group chatting vary enormously according to the topic tackled. The more academic and professional they are, the more likely to be factual in aim. The more social and ludic on the other hand, the more they contain sequences which have negligible factual content.

The discussion in group chatting is characterized by being less tightly structured in comparison with virtually all other varieties of written language, but it rarely becomes as unfocused, rambling, and inconsequential as everyday conversation (Crystal, 2006: 152). The present study will be limited to private chat only.

1. 3. Characteristics of Chatting

The linguistic structure of chatting interaction tends to look somewhat like that of face to face interaction, but with some notable exceptions. In chat conversation omission of unnecessary linguistic information, some grammatical structures, elaborations and repetition of ideas are widely used (Hudson, 2007: 14).

Werry (1996: 47) highlights the idea that while all different modes, technologies and social spaces change the form of communication in different ways. All have in common that they involve the production of writing through computers with synchronous textual dialogue takes place between spatially distant interlocutors.

Panyametheekul and Herring (2003: 6) maintain a list of characteristics that distinguish synchronous blinguistic asynchronous CMC according to the gender of the user. In synchronous CMC, males use more violent verbs, profanity, emoticons, laughter as well as neutral and effectuate verbs.

The most distinctive features of online written based interaction are flexibility and freeness, therefore, letters and numbers are frequently used in combination to form a special type of abbreviation (Hong-meil, 2010: 99). Ya-dong (2013) has tackled language of chatting from formal, semantic and syntactic level. He stated that one of the outstanding characteristics of web chat English is the creation of new words periodically. People who rarely use net may not understand many words and usage. Some regards language used in chatting as having some sense of uniqueness in its own features. Language of chatting has attracted lots of attention lately because of its wide spread influence on people's life and language. There is no well-established characteristics for online written based chatting. Many attempts have been made to characterize language of chatting.

In the following section, some characteristics of language of chatting are presented based on previous researches. They represent the focus of the present study.

1. 3. 1. Orthographic Features

Crystal (2006: 37) refers to orthographic features as prosody and paralanguage phonological terms which capture the notion of 'it ain't what you say but the way that you say it' – as expressed through vocal variations in pitch (intonation), loudness (stress), speed, rhythm, pause, and tone of voice. The traditional form of writing is changed within the medium of online chatting. This is evident in the exaggerated use of spelling, punctuation, capitals, spacing, and special symbols for emphasis. Examples include repeated letters (hahahaha, hiiiiiii, thaaaaanx, noooo), repeated punctuation marks (no more!!!!!, who????, hey!!!!!!!!, see started??????????????), and the following range of emphatic conventions: all capitals for 'shouting': YOU SHOULD NOT DO IT.

1. 3. 1. 1. Acronyms

Traditionally, an acronym is defined as a word formed from the initial letters or portions of words belonging to a group of words like the word 'radar' stands for 'radio detecting and ranging'. The use of acronyms in chatting differs, instead of writing new words from group of words, letters may stand as a short hand for phrases. (Barnes 2003:

94). Ruan (2012: 152) stats that acronyms is formed by picking the initial letters of words, phrases or even sentences. As such in chatting, acronyms are no longer restricted to initials of words or short phrases. but could replace a whole sentence: WDYS (What did you say?). In chatting, users usually create new acronyms in order to achieve their communicative needs. As a result many acronyms used in chat rooms have not been conventionalized.

Scholars attempted to find the motivations behind the use of acronyms in chatting. Zhuanglin Hu (1988, 21) explains one of the reasons which is economy. Great number of acronyms in chatting follows a principle of economy. Thus, achieving maximum result with minimum amount of effort. This indicate s "the short form is preferred to a longer or more involved one". As such acronyms are regarded as easier and more time-saving than complete words, phrases and sentences. The emergence of numerous acronyms shows the creativity of chatting participants. To speed up response time is another motivation in which students are after in chatting. The replacement of full words by letters creates new style of speed-writing (Barnes 2003: 94). Acronyms are one of the most remarkable features, which enable users to save a great deal of energy and time.

Most participants in chatting are familiar with some of the basic acronyms. Here is an example copied from the Facebook chat room:

Female: sis hope v find time to help me

1. 3. 1. 2. Capitalization

Capitalization is one of the earliest writing conventions that is regarded as one of the essentials for good writing. Capitalization of names and the upper and lower case letters are taught from the earlier levels of schooling (Benjamin, 2013: 102). Barnes (2003: 92) stats that in computer mediated communication, the use of capital letters stands for SHOUTING.

Capitalization in chatting stands for loud volume as such words are often used for expressing emphasis or loud volume. In casual online chats, the use of capitalized words is the common way of marking emphatic stress. Here is an example, in which the powerful feelings and anger are expressed through in capital letters: **TOO MUCH USE OF CAPITALS IS BAD MANNERS** (Ruan, 2012: 153).

1. 3. 1. 3. Abbreviations

Werry (1996: 53) investigates the influences that determine the form of CMC chat interaction. Special, temporal and social constraint acts as important limiting conditions that affect the size and shape of communication in roughly analogous way. Factors such as screen size, average typing speed, minimal response times, competition for attention, channel of population and the pace of channel conversation contribute to the emergence of certain characteristic properties. As such the writing style of such mods of communication tends to be full of brevity, abbreviations and the use of stored linguistic formulas.

The features of abbreviations increase the speed with which messages can be exchanged, making the form of the exchange more like face to face interaction. Orthographic reduction resembles phonological reduction and ellipsis in rapid, informal speech, rendering chat exchanges "speech-like" in their degree of informality as well (ibid: 56).

Abbreviations are part of the written language tradition, appearing both in hand written manuscripts and print. Their most common function in both off-line writing and CMC is to conserve energy and space. There are many reasons for the use of abbreviations in online chatting such as efficiency and convenience. There is a another socially-based motivation for incorporating abbreviations into CMC messages which is to indicate one's membership among network of people. Like the use of slang in face-to-face speech or written language, abbreviations are one way of indicating group membership in written based online writing (Baron, 2003: 21).

According to Ruan (2012: 151) abbreviation is also called clipping. That is to say, a new word is created by cutting the final part, the initial part or cutting off both the initial and the final part with only the middle part left.

As such abbreviation is regarded by many scholars as one of the distinguished properties that characterize written based online chatting.

Section Two

2. 1. Analysis of Chatting Conversations

In this section 9 conversations of M-F British participants are analyzed. The analysis shows the distribution of the orthographic features in the data with their numbers and percentages.

2. 1. 1. Logo Types

In this section logo types are exposed statistically in M-F British conversations

2, 1, 1, 1, Emoticons

Emoticons in M-F is shown in the following table.

The low percentage of emoticons in the data indicates that participants did not regard emoticons as a good strategy in chatting. Though emoticons play an important role in chatting participants prefers to resort to other means to express their feelings.

2. 1. 1. 2. Symbols Replacing Words

The number of symbols replacing words in M-F conversations is 9. Participants make use of such symbols to stand for words in order to get rid of formal writing and for ease of typing. Mediums of chatting requires the participants to type as fast as possible to save time and effort. The following table illustrates the number and percentage of symbols replacing words in M-F British conversations.

2. 1. 2. Orthographic Mistakes

Orthographic mistakes are exposed statistically in M-F British conversations with some explanations.

2. 1. 2. 1. Colloquial Spelling

2. 1. 2. 1. 1. Abbreviations

Abbreviations play an important role in CMC and specially in chatting. Two types of abbreviations are investigated in M-F British participants. The percentages and numbers of abbreviations in the data are illustrated in the table below.

The table shows that the percentages of abbreviations in the data are high. Such use indicates that the participants make use of this strategy in order to cope with the nature of medium of communication. Because of the pressure of the size of the message and the need to write as fast as possible, the participants resort to use abbreviations in chatting.

2. 1. 2. 1. 2. Consonant Writing

The table below shows the number and percentage of consonant writing words in the conversations.

The table shows that the percentage of consonant writing in chatting is low. Such strategy may render words to lose their meaning and for miscommunication to take place. Participants resort to write words by deleting vowel letters and leaving consonant letters to stand for the whole word. This strategy save time and effort in chatting and enable participants to be as fast as possible.

2. 1. 2. 2. Prosodic Spelling

2. 1. 2. 2. 1. Repetition

As in M-M and M-F conversations, repetition of letters is higher than repetition of words in the data. The participants resort to repetition of letters for emphasis. Sometimes repetition is used for prestige and to cope with the nature of the medium. The following table illustrate the number and percentage of the two types of repetition in M-F conversations.

2. 1. 2. 2. 2. Punctuations

The following table illustrate the number and the percentage of punctuations in M-F conversations.

The table shows that the category of omitting punctuation marks is the highest among the other categories in M-F British conversations. The participants focus on conveying meaning rather than sticking to formal features of writing.

2. 1. 2. 2. 3. Case

In formal writing, there are restrictions on the capitalization in sentences for example beginning sentences with capital letter. In chatting the participants do not pay great attention to these restrictions when typing. They use capitalization as a strategy in order to fulfill their communicative means. The following table presents the numbers and percentages of case in M-F conversations.

The table shows that the highest category is mixing of capital and lower case. The second higher percentage is when writing all in lower case and the lowest is when writing all in capital letters. These percentages illustrate that the participants do not neglect formal capitalization and that is the highest among the other categories. The percentage of the second category is related to the nature of the medium and the need to type fast regardless of the other formal features.

2. 1. 2. 3. 1. Un-conventional Spoken Like Words

The number and the percentages of the current category are presented in the following table.

The table shows that the category of symbols replacing words exhibits a high percentage in M-F conversations. The participants try to override the restrictions in the formal writing and to write words similar to the spoken one

2. 1. 3. 1. Code Switching

Only 2 cases of tag switching are found in the data.

The Conclusions

The present study tackled some orthographic features in language of chatting in nine text-only computer mediated conversations by British native speakers. The analysis of the data has come up with the following conclusions:

- 1. In written based CMC, unconventional abbreviations, misuse of punctuation marks and other un formal features constitute linguistic structure of language of chatting.
- 2. British native speakers do not regard code switching as en effective strategy in chatting while it is used in chatting of Iraqi participants.
- 3. The use of paralinguistic features, like emotions, helps participants to override the limitations of the medium though the participants do not make much use of such features.

- As Apollon mentioned, to understand the effectiveness of the TMD system there is no need to solve the response of the system for the second mode. It was clearly discussed in the class that TMD is mainly used to prevent resonance. Therefore, if the frequency of the system with TMD is very close to the frequency of the load, it implies that the TMD does not work effectively.
